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09.00 -10.00 am Al Fateh Islamic center – Grand Mosque

Bahrain's Grande Mosque is set against a back drop of palm trees and the sea. Its exquisite architecture, crowned by the worlds most largest fibre glass dome. Non muslims are welcome to visit the mosque, it is important to dress appropriately.

10.15 -11.00 am Muharraq old souk

Visit one of the many traditional old souk of Muharraq. The souk is a maze of narrow streets lined with small shops and booths selling. This market is nearly 100 years old, and consider as the second largest souk area in Bahrain. Just a short walk from the Muharraq souk (market) are two famous traditional houses of Bahrain, Beit Shaikh Isa bin Ali and Beit Siyadi.

11.15 – 12.00 am Arad Fort

Arad fort was built nearly between the end of the fifteenth century and the early sixteenth century. In 1521, the Portuguese occupied Bahrain by using their fleet which was stationed in Oman (Hormuz). During their rule, they used the fort as one of the military garrisons to confront local opposition and the Ottoman interference.

12.15 – 01.30 pm Dilmun Museum & Shk Isa Bin Ali house

The city's origins are ancient, going back to the time of Dilmun some five thousand years ago, but it came to prominence in the historical records during the era of Tylos when Bahrain came under domination of the Selucid Greeks, and Muharraq was the centre of a pagan cult dedicated to the shark god, Awal.

Shaikh Isa bin Ali Al Khalifa, the King's great-great-grandfather, was sovereign from 1869 to 1932, the longest reign of a Bahrain ruler. His home in Muharraq provides a glimpse of royal life in the 19th century with period architecture and wall carvings. It's also one of the best places to feel the amazing effects of the windtower
